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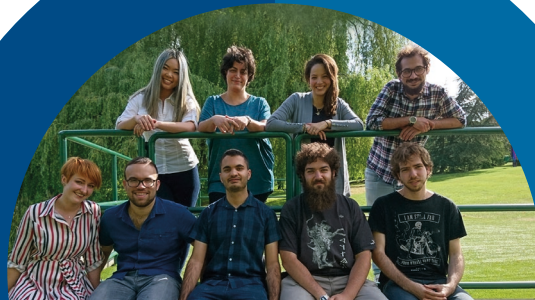
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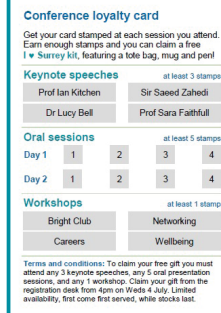

DELIVERING HIGH QUALITY RESEARCH THROUGHOUT YOUR CAREER: PLANNING OR SERENDIPITY?

Professor Kitchen is Emeritus Professor of Neuropharmacology at Surrey and CEO of REF2020 Consulting, providing advice to Universities on research assessment. He has held research grants from major biomedical funders, including leading an €8.1m EC grant, supervised over 35 PhD students and published 250 research papers in leading journals, including *Nature and Cell*. He is an elected fellow of the BPS and the Royal Society of Biology and founding President of the European Opioid Conference. For six years he was Associate Dean for Research in FHMS and was a Sub-Panel member for two UK research assessment exercises (RAE2008 and REF2014).

BREAKING NEW GROUND THROUGH INTERDISCIPLINARY RESEARCH: CHALLENGES AND REWARDS

Lucy Bell joined the University of Surrey in 2013 after completing an AHRC-funded PhD in Latin American Literary and Cultural Studies at the University of Cambridge. She specialises in Latin American Studies, cultural and political theory, environmental criticism and transnational social movement studies. She has published widely in top peer-reviewed journals ranging from *Paragraph* to *Cultural Studies*. She is currently leading an AHRC-funded project entitled Precarious Publishing in Latin America: Relations, Meaning and Community in Movement (October 2017 – January 2020). This collaborative, transnational and multi-disciplinary project takes a fresh look at editoriales cartoneras (waste-picking publishers) in Mexico and Brazil through new interdisciplinary methodologies.
