OVERVIEW

Challenges to Europe - European Challenges Conference

Date & Time | **Day 1**: 28 May 2025, 11:00am-5:30pm | **Day 2**: 29 May 2025, 9:30am-5:30pm **Location** | LTE, **Lecture Theatre Block**

Theme | 'Europe' has been severely challenged in multiple ways in recent years. Economically, by the protectionist policies of successive US Presidents and a difficult relationship with China; militarily, mainly by the spreading of a devastating armed conflict in Ukraine, and because of Russia's stance towards its European neighbours; and politically, due to lacking the ability to respond effectively to unprecedented developments, such as climate change, while the internal opposition to the liberal consensus grows in the shape of radical right movements. These and other challenges have shaken Europe's (self-)perception as a key actor of 'the West' and an advocate of human rights, democracy, and liberty.

The conference will encourage discussion across disciplinary and (sub)field boundaries, including, but not limited to, political science, international relations, public policy and political theory perspectives. It will be hosted by the University of Surrey's foremost policy research institution, the Centre for Britain and Europe. The conference is co-organised by the PSA German Politics Specialist Group, PSA Greek Politics Specialist Group, and PSA Italian Politics Specialist Group.





Public Transport

- Bus runs frequently from Manor Park to the campus with bus No.1 and 4. £2 per ticket
- **E-bike** rental Beryl runs the e-bike services in Guildford. You will need to download the Beryl app to use the bike. Starts from 16p/min.
- **Train** Southwest runs frequent direct trains from the Waterloo London Rail Station to Guildford Rail Station in 35 minutes

International Travel: The nearest airport to Guildford is the **Gatwick London Airport** (IATA: LGW). Guildford Railway Station is 47 minutes away via train from the Gatwick Railways Station (by the South Terminal of Gatwick Airport). The **South Western Railway** runs frequently and tickets can be purchased with a credit/debit card at the automated ticket kiosks at the airport.

The Guildford Railway Station is located within the town centre, and a 15-minute walk to the university campus.
